The mission of the American International School of Lagos is to deliver a quality American education to its diverse students in a nurturing environment which inspires a passion for learning, fosters a sense of wonder and curiosity, and teaches responsible citizenship through a partnership among school, home, and community.

Background

The American International School of Lagos (AISL) is a private, coeducational school, which offers an American educational program for students of all nationalities in grades Pre-K through 12th grade. The school was founded in 1964 and continues to thrive as an independent U.S. State Department school supported, in part, by a school-to-school partnership with Tacoma Public Schools in Tacoma, Washington and the Klein Independent School District in Houston, Texas. The August to June school year is divided into trimesters, for the elementary students, and semesters for the secondary students. AISL is an IBO World School.

Faculty

In the 2009-2010 school year, there are 72 full time certificated teachers, including a full time Curriculum Director and two counselors. The faculty includes 49 U.S. citizens, 9 host country nationals, and 14 third country nationals. 75% of the AISL faculty members hold a Masters Degree. All faculty members are certificated with a minimum of two years of experience.

Calendar

AISL follows a school calendar based upon that of a typical U.S. school system. The school year is 181 school days in length beginning the last week in August and closing the first or second week in June. Significant holiday breaks include Christmas/New Year and Easter. The calendar for 2009-2010 is attached to this brochure.

Enrollment

At the beginning of the 2009-2010 school year, enrollment is 751 with a very long waiting list. The student population consists of 37% American, 13% Nigerian, and 50% from 53 different countries. There are 24 students who are dependants of the U.S. State Department of Foreign Service Employees.

Accreditation

AISL is fully accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. The accreditation self-study was successfully completed during the 2003-2004 school year and a certificate of accreditation was awarded on November 5, 2004. AISL will complete a five-year update before the next schedule reaccreditation. AISL has been recommended for reaccreditation in the spring of 2010. (www.aislalagos.org) AISL was authorized as an International Baccalaureate Diploma World school in December 2007. The IB Curriculum is recognized as a rigorous college preparatory curriculum at colleges and universities worldwide.

Facilities

The school is situated on an 8-acre campus. The campus contains a main building that is a 3-level structure, with 40 teaching stations of about 800 square feet each, and 7 smaller instructional areas. Specialist teaching areas include; and Art Studio, Drama classroom, Technology Lab with Internet connectivity, and three Science laboratories (Elementary, Middle and High School). An additional Annex was built to accommodate the secondary program. The Annex building includes 15 additional classrooms. There are two music instruction rooms with two adjacent practice rooms. Each classroom has at least two networked computer workstations and there are six portable computer carts containing a full classroom set of laptops with wireless networking capacity for different areas of the campus. The library holds over 30,000 volumes and is approximately 2800 square feet in size and incorporates a group instruction area, individual reference and study areas, primary age student reading room, computer lab, periodical section and audio visual resource facility. The sports and recreational facilities include a full size gymnasium that is also used as an auditorium, 2 lighted tennis courts, an outdoor basketball court, a 100m x 55m sports field with a 100 meter sprint track, aerobics and weight training rooms, and an extensive Big Toy apparatus. The facility also includes a 25-meter swimming pool, and a large conference room is also on the site.

Student Conduct

At the American International School, we recognize that learning is essential. The emphasis is to provide a positive learning environment for every child. The administration and staff promote responsible behaviours by stressing SELF-discipline, SELF-respect and RESPECT for the rights and safety of others.

AISL Student Expectations

1. I will show respect for myself, others and property.
2. I will work and play safely.

Student Body

The enrolment at AISL is approximately 750 students in grades pre-kindergarten through 12. An effort is made to keep class size at or below 19 through grade six and below 25 in secondary school. Smaller classes are formed for Math and French at the secondary level. Teaching assistants are assigned to each elementary classroom.

There are 47 nationalities represented in our student population of which 33% are American, 21.4% are Host Country Nationals and the remaining 45.6% are Third Country Nationals.

Curriculum

The American International School of Lagos, Nigeria, has established curriculum standards in all areas that are based on the US National Standards. In order to maintain high achievement, a curriculum coordinator is in charge of monitoring and periodically revising the curriculum. The revision process, based on current research, follows a five-year cycle. Teachers, administrators, and parents are involved in the decision making process. Open forums are conducted to inform parents and gain feedback regarding curriculum. To prepare students to achieve at their highest levels, the curriculum is designed to promote integration with technology and other subject areas. Library and community resources and Internet access as well as hands on and cooperative activities are planned to encourage a positive attitude toward learning. AISL was authorized as an International Baccalaureate Diploma World school in December 2007. The IB Curriculum is recognized as a rigorous college preparatory curriculum at colleges and universities worldwide. The goal of the American International School, Lagos is to ensure a rigorous, updated curriculum that meets the needs of an international body.

The grade level/content area standards are on our web site and can be accessed by our Web link. Examination of these documents along with the published calendar provides parents, students and interested parties with a thorough description of a student's year of study.

Formal conferences are held bi-annually while parents and teachers schedule informal meetings as necessary. Report cards are sent home three times a year.

Students in grades 3-10 take the International Schools' Assessment in reading, mathematics and writing. The Cognitive Abilities Test is administered to all students in first through tenth grades. Students in grades 2-10 sit The Iowa Test of Basic Skills. ITBS test results provide grade level equivalents, national, international, private school, and high socioeconomic school percentile rankings. Parents are provided with a summary of their child's achievement, and the Child Study Team reviews individual and grade level scores. Students and/or areas of concerns are identified, and plans are formulated to address deficits.

An integral part of the AISL program is the school library containing over 30,000 volumes in addition to computerized technology for use in research. It serves as a valuable resource and is staffed by professionals.

Elementary School

The elementary school curriculum is comprised of various areas of study. These include Language Arts, Reading, Mathematics, Science, and the Social Sciences. Elementary students also receive instruction in African Studies, the Fine Arts and Performing Arts, French, Spanish, Computers, Library Science, Physical Education, and Swimming.

Secondary School

English, History, Mathematics, Science, Physical Education, Health, World Language (French and Spanish) are required courses in the secondary curriculum. Elective subjects include a variety of selections in Art, Music, Science, Language Arts, Drama, life skills and Computer Science.

Homework

The American International School of Lagos has an established board policy on homework. Homework is viewed as "an integral part of the learning process and presents opportunities for practice or drill in those skills already taught, preparation for material to be presented or taught subsequently, extension or transfer of a skill or concept to a new situation, and completing assigned work not finished in class" (Policy 3.300).

The policy specifies daily averages for Elementary through Secondary and provides guidelines for absences and the role of the teacher, student, and parent. Daily assignment books are available and distributed to all students. An after school study table is mandatory for secondary students deemed as not making satisfactory progress.

In accordance with its mission and vision statements, AISL is committed to providing a quality American education to its diverse students. It seeks to challenge students to achieve their full potential and provide teachers and administrators opportunities to grow through association with an excellent curriculum. With an ongoing determination to improve, AISL remains an exciting place for students, staff, and parents.

Student Progress & Evaluation

AISL is committed to continual assessment of student performance and to sharing all pupil appraisals with parents. Formal reports of pupil progress and performance are issued to parents three times a year. A Parent-Teacher conference with every parent is scheduled early in the first term of the school year and in the middle of the second term. Teachers communicate continuously with parents regarding student progress, particularly if a student is experiencing difficulty. Parental cooperation and dialogue are encouraged and discussion of concerns is encouraged.

Attendance

Students need to be in school. Time lost from class due to absence is irretrievable. The Board of Directors has adopted a strict Attendance Policy, Policy 3.700, which is available upon request.

Student Transfer or Withdrawal

When a student transfers or withdraws from AISL to enter another school, the student's records will be forwarded upon written request by the parents or the receiving school. *Student records will not be forwarded unless they have been cleared by the administration and all financial obligations to AISL have been fulfilled.*

Dress Code

AISL students are expected to follow the standard dress requirements. Students not meeting standard dress requirements will be in violation of student conduct policy 3.801.

Special Events

We have some very special events that occur on an annual basis at AISL. They are planned and organized in a collaborative manner with administration, teachers, students and parents. The major events of the year are listed below:

Educational Field Trips

Educational and Athletic field trips are available for students at AISL. They are designed to enrich our students in the areas of science and second language acquisition. We send students to a Sea Camp, on a Tour through France and another through Spain. Secondary students participate in music festival, athletic competitions, and student forums with an international focus and experiences that support the academic curriculum.

After School Activity and Sports Program

We feel our school has one of the most extensive and comprehensive after school activity programs in the world. The AISL administration, staff, parents, and local professionals are responsible for this incredible array of offerings. We encourage all of our students to be a part of this program. It is a wonderful opportunity for them to explore and experience many new and exciting activities that will truly enrich their total educational development. The entire program is outlined for you below.

After School Activity Offerings: Board games, Computers, Cooking, Kick ball, Wall Ball, Arts & Crafts, Videos, Story hour, Science, French, Choir, Instruments, Origami, Calendar making, Pottery, Calligraphy, Karate, Judo, Taekwondo, Gymnastics, Swimming, Computers, Ceramics, Ping Pong, Golf, Tennis, Cub Scouts and Girl Scouts, National Honor Society, Drama, Student Government and Chess

Competitive Sports

This is an opportunity for the students of AISL to experience serious, competitive athletics with their peers and other local schools. There are a limited number of sports available in many of the activities. Expectations and commitments are at a higher level than the activities offered during P.E., after school activities, and the Saturday Sports program.

Coaches Comments: Since improvement and success for all of us can come through different achievements, the following is a list of areas that we feel are most important and will be stressed throughout the season: Self-esteem, responsibility as a student and an athlete, work ethic, sportsmanship, preparing both mentally and physically for competition, goal setting, improving strength, speed, quickness, and commitment. All sports are interrelated and the more we participate and compete, the better athletes we can become both mentally and physically. There are P.E. dress requirements for secondary students: black or blue shorts and white T-shirts.

Offerings: Soccer, Basketball, Volleyball, Gymnastics, Tennis, Badminton, Track and Field, and Swimming

Saturday Sports Program

This is a two-sport program, Baseball/Softball and Soccer, organized and run by the parents of AISL in conjunction with the school's assistance in facilities, ordering of equipment and general support. Student participation and sportsmanship is the essence of this program. The commissioners and parent volunteers of each sport handle registration, fees, league structure, coaches, sponsorship, equipment, uniforms, schedules, officials and rules.

Community Recreation and Activity

Parents are given the opportunity to sign up for activities throughout the school year. We have regular activities that are available throughout the year. Some examples are: lap swim in the evenings, walking and jogging in the mornings before school, aerobics, yoga and weight lifting class taught by staff members, social games in basketball, softball, tennis and volleyball. The school is the center of the community.

Parent-Teacher Organization

The PTO is an active participant in the growth and support of AISL. The parents, through this association, provide leadership, and direct support that would otherwise be non-existent. The Fun Fair, Bingo Night and Book sale are just some of the events that have brought the entire family together with the AISL community for fun and fellowship. The school store, operated by the PTO, stocks all supplies which students will need in their classes. The PTO also hosts a multitude of activities for students. Video nights, dances and picnics are examples of the great times provided by these dedicated parents.

The Elementary School Year

The Elementary AISL school year is divided into three (3) trimesters running from mid-August to first week in November, then to first week in March, and then to second week in June.

Vehicle Permits
